

Executive Commission 2013 News of the Day

Wednesday, 10 July 2013

The morning started with another thought provoking sermon. Rod focused on Philippians 2:1-16 and spoke about attitude. He asked us to test our mindset towards others illustrating how we need to put the interests of others before ourselves.

What is choking the life out of our Presbyteries is our wrong attitude to others. We need to be Kenotic which means to be nothing or to empty oneself rather than be chaotic. He then provided a list to describe the behavioral attitudes associated to these two words.

After devotions we moved into the first Decision Session at the EXCOM. Some important decisions that were taken from the reports on Tuesday are summarised as follows:

- next Assembly is in Limpopo Presbytery in July 2014.
- Looking at restructuring the Central Office in line with the UPCSA Vision and Mission.
- Encouraging Presbyteries to take a more pastoral approach in conflict matters rather than using legal processes.
- A census of the UPCSA.
- A report on the fraud situation and all that was done to rectify the financial systems in the Central Office.
- More than R 1.5m is to be recovered from the fraud.
- How to address the issue of unallocated deposits by congregations.
- A reminder that ministers must become members of the UPCSA Pension Fund and the responsibility of congregations therein.
- The General Secretary was reappointed for a further term of 5 years.

In the second Listening Session the meeting received the reports of the Ministry, Education and Training, Mission and Discipleship, Church Associations and Communications.

We wrestled with certain matters in the report of the Ministry Committee as we addressed a Petition and Appeal. The matters were referred to the Insaka Groups to dialogue.

We warmly received the report from the Mission and Discipleship Committee and was impressed with the enthusiastic work of the Committee. Some matters from the Education and Training Committee related matters raised cause for concern.
