

SACC'S STATEMENT OF THE DESTABILISATION OF THE COUNTRY

The results of elections of the South African Council of Churches (SACC) met on Thursday, 28 February 2020, and expressed their full concern at the manner in which a certain number of our country's citizens are at liberty in the South African constitutional order. They expressed the conviction only in terms favourable to their respective interests.
