### Friends,


As I have been travelling within our church and beyond, I have witnessed a common modern spiritual crisis that we as Christians are existing in. It is a two-fold crisis.

#### THE UPCSA WILL BE A RECONCILED CHURCH

All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God. (2 Corinthians 5: 18-20 NIV)

The 2012 General Assembly of the UPCSA adopted a vision, "To be a reconciled community of Christians exercising a prophetic witness to Christ". After the adoption of this vision, the UPCSA published a document called THE UPCSA MISSION STRATEGY, with a sub-title "Reflections on the biblical and theological background to the Vision and Mission Priorities of the UPCSA". I, hereby, take the privilege of sharing the exposition of the vision of the UPCSA that is given in that document, as shown below, lest we forget.

Our vision recognizes our diversity as a Christian community and sets out the

objective "to be a reconciled community of Christians." We seek to be a "reconciled community" bearing in mind what the Apostle points out in II Cor. 5:19 "God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself". Reconciliation is a gift from God, and we have the responsibility to pass it on: "He has entrusted to us the ministry reconciliation". We cannot pass on what we received and taken have not responsibility for. This is further highlighted in John 17: 20-21 where Jesus prayed for the unity of believers. If reconciliation is not true for Christians, then they have no message to proclaim to others.

Our unity also strengthens and gives credibility to our Prophetic witness as we proclaim God's sovereignty over the world. There is so much of evil, sin and injustice in the world that we cannot afford to remain silent or complicit. As Christians we are called to be "Witnesses" (Acts 1:8) "You will be witnesses of me in Jerusalem....to the ends of the earth" and Acts 22:15 "Witnesses of what you have seen and heard." We cannot speak to others concerning things we do not know. Christ must be a living reality to us so that we can be a credible witness of what we have seen and heard.

In the process of drafting the Strategic Plan of the UPCSA, the planning team conducted a robust environmental scanning, which culminated in the proposition of the nine (9) strategic guidelines. One of those says: "The UPCSA will be a reconciled church". This was response to the findings of the environmental scanning which had revealed, among others, that there are irreconcilable differences among the Presbyterians which could not be left unattended. No document may do justice in describing how the differences manifest among us. It is also not my intention to do so in this article, as we have repeatedly pointed to the issues of inequality, injustice, and others.

In this article, we want to encourage the Presbyterians to seek and work for reconciliation with selves, with others, and with God.


Many people have problems with themselves and cannot forgive themselves for what they have gone through, for what they have committed or omitted, said or not said. Megan O'Sullivan (2022: nd) identifies with this experience and promotes finding a "quiet place of private reconciliation". Private reconciliation, according to Megan, is "a kind closeness one creates with themselves, a series of negotiations that has absolutely nothing to do with any bystander. It is deciding one can bear to become friends with the person inside, to spend time with themselves, to champion their strengths, to comfort their faults (gently), and to commit to the growing pains". Reconciling with self brings about relief and ability to reconcile with others.

Reconciling with others entails having the heart to forgive and commitment to move

forward. It is about letting go of the past and deal with the weight of resentment against any person who made you feel pain. In 1 John 4: 20 (NIV), it is written, "Whoever claims to love God yet hates a brother or sister is a liar. For whoever does not love their brother and sister, whom they have seen, cannot love God, whom they have not seen."

We are guided on how we may reconcile with God. Reconciling with God is about the restoration of a relationship which was broken due to sin. The Greek word used for sin in Romans 3: 23 refers to sin as "missing the mark". That verse also speaks of falling out of God's grace. Paul advised Timothy in 1 Timothy 2:5 – 6, "For there is one God and one mediator between God and mankind, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all people."

The UPCSA is called to the ministry of reconciliation, to help its member to work towards and master the three dimensions of reconciliation - with self, with others and with God. At some point, we espoused the four cardinal points, one of which was "mending the relationships". We call on our ministers to champion this ministry from the pulpits and in pastoral engagements. Let us restore the broken relations and work to be a reconciled church.



# CHRISTIANS AND THE 2024 ELECTIONS BY BOBBY GODSELL.

The 29<sup>th</sup> May 2024 election will be the country's most important election since 1994.

In 1994 close to 20 million South Africans stood in patient, joyful queues for several days to choose their new government. The April election followed several years of both violence and negotiation: hope and fear. Those 20 million citizens were voting in an election which by agreement with the contending political parties was going to elect a government of national unity. According to our interim constitution every party getting 5% of the vote would have a seat in parliament and each party gaining 20% would have a Deputy President.

Beyond these rules people queued together and voted together for a South Africa that would work together to create a better future for all. This was the promise of the rainbow nation.

What can Christians do to make 2024 our "second chance" election? To recapture the hope of unity, shared freedom and common destiny? Of people served by a government whose only purpose was to make a better life for all? To consolidate a national compact of non racialism, constitutional democracy, clean government and a growing and increasingly inclusive economy?

What if individual Christians and most particularly groups of Christians took it upon themselves to get involved in recognising, embracing and supporting the people and

• institutions of our public service? Government at national, provincial and local level whose job it is to provide order and development. Politicians and political parties whose job it is to direct government. Could we, the citizens take centre stage in the

2024 elections in a spirit of joy and hope and not with cynicism, contempt, rage and despair?

Could the attitude of citizens in general and Christian citizens in particular centrally determine the success of this election?

Our first duty to Caesar is to register to vote. Our citizenship cannot be complete until it is reflected on the country's voter's roll. This is very easy to do. Registering online is as easy as registering for a covid vaccination. Every election since 1994 has seen a declining proportion of our adult population registering to vote. Can Christians be different? This is more than an individual act. Are our worship, family, workplace and friendship communities also registered?

Our second duty is to do the hard work now of using our vote intentionally and faithfully.

# We cannot vote for a party by default: simply because we always have, or our parents have, or because of our skin colour, or our social and financial "place" in our broader society.

Our faith has always connected power to justice. Both the Old and New Testaments command prophets and priest, disciples and apostles in their exercise of power. This is part of our religious tradition and covenant. What covenant will we impose on those who receive our vote?

# The Value of Scripture: The Final Authority of Faith & Life

The value of scripture is beyond measure. It is unimaginable to think of the Christian church without the Bible. Now, as theologians and ministers, we different might have theological perspectives. For some of us, we believe the Bible is inerrant, while others accept the Bible as a flawed text written by humans but inspired by God. Fortunately, we form part of a broad church, which allows differences. That being said, I share some thoughts on the value of scripture to me as a Christian, a minister, and a father hoping to encourage his children to follow God.

Peter wrote that: "For we did not follow cleverly devised stories when we told you about the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ in power, but we were eyewitnesses of his majesty...We also have the prophetic message as something completely reliable, and you will do well to pay attention to it, as to a light shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. Above all, you

must understand that no prophecy of Scripture came about by the prophet's own interpretation of things. For prophecy never had its origin in the human will, but prophets, though human, spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit." 2 Peter 1:16,19-21

The great author CS Lewis devised what is commonly known as the Lewis Trifecta, which concerns the truth about Iesus as the Saviour of the world. He said that when we consider the claims of Jesus, we have three options. We either have to decide they are the claims of an attention-seeker, but why would he be willing to die for his lies? Or it is the claims of a madman, but then why are His words so powerful, so coherent, so true? Or we are faced with the inevitable truth that Iesus is our Lord and Saviour. Once we accept this truth, we want to learn more about Jesus, and the best place to do so is from the Word of God. Peter makes it clear that the Scriptures comes from God. That is wasn't simply stories made up by fallible and corruptible human beings, but by the Creator of the universe who has given us a way to draw closer to Him.

The Bible is the true and inerrant Word of God. This means 'incapable of being wrong'. To many, this seems illogical. How can a book written thousands of years ago still be relevant? What about outdated rules and requirements? What about inaccuracies, inconsistencies, or difficult to understand parts? What about the fact that all the books were written by fallible human beings? When we say we believe the Bible is true, it doesn't mean we blindly accept what is written in it. It means we accept it in faith. The Word of God was written to

common people, not to theological professors. The writers assumed that common people would read it, understand it, apply it and be led by the Holy Spirit who inspired it.

While many scoff at the inaccuracies in scripture, we can apply the same logic here: When we accept the claims in scripture, we also accept that human beings with their own idiosyncrasies wrote the words of Scripture. Yet at the same time, we accept that God caused the words he wanted to be written to be recorded. God does not lie and cannot tell a falsehood; it is not in his nature. Thus, if God inspired the human authors, then the words of Scripture must be without error. There will always be questions of interpretation, and there will always be debates about the specific application or meaning of a passage. When we hold to the truth of the Bible, when we recognise it as a divine book, bearing the imprint of God's utter truthfulness, we won't try to explain away some of the hard truths it contains. Rather, we will continue to trust the Bible, continue to read it, continue to grapple with the parts we struggle to understand and finally, share it with those around us.

One of my favourite authors, Kevin DeYoung, in his book Taking God at His Word (2014) writes: "There is no more authoritative declaration than what we find in the Word of God, no firmer ground to stand on, no "more final" argument that can be spoken after Scripture has spoken... You can use the word of God to come to wrong conclusions, but you cannot find any wrong conclusions in the Word of God. You do not need another special revelation from God outside the Bible. You can listen to the voice of God every

day. Christ still speaks, because the Spirit has already spoken. If you want to hear from God, go to the book that records only what he has said. Immerse yourself in the Word of God you will not find anything more sure".

As we circle back to the value of scripture, I can only say it is invaluable. As a Christian, it is my touchpoint, the first place to go when I have questions, an encouragement and a source of strength. As a minister, I firmly believe that we are called to open up a specific piece of text in our preaching and teaching. We are called not to add nor to subtract anything, but rather help elucidate and apply the text to people's lives. All scripture is valuable, all scripture can be used to teach, all scripture can inspire. As a father, it is a great joy to read scripture with my sons. In the hustle and bustle of our busy, connected world, slowing down to read the Bible with our families' nurtures connection, restores values and always opens up interesting questions or discussions. So whether we are digging into God's Word in a personal, ministerial or family capacity, the Holy Spirit is there to enlighten and guide us.

### **EXECUTIVE COMMISION 2024**

The last General Assembly resolved "to have the 2024 Executive Commission hosted by the Central Office Team in Gauteng and sets the dates as Sunday 23 to Thursday 27 June 2024". Since then, the staff at Tiyo Soga House have been working hard to deliver on this resolution. They became the Local Organising Committee working very close with the Assembly Business Committee.

Much as this will be in hybrid we still had to identify a Presbytery around Gauteng for the venue where all the administration and facilitation will take place. We are thankful to the Presbytery of Tshwane for agreeing to provide this space. Arrangements are now at an advanced stage. The opening service will be held on Sunday 23 June at St. Andrews Presbyterian Church, Time: 09:00, Pretoria. Invitation to this service is to all Ministers and Congregations within the boundaries of Tshwane Presbytery as well as to every member of the Presbyterian family who might be around Pretoria at the time. Both St. Andrews and Pretoria Central Presbyterian Congregations are looking forward to hosting us for this great service.

Presbyteries have appointed their Commissioners and very soon we will be doing dry runs on the Zoom platform so that everyone is fully prepared to participate in the virtual format of a meeting. There will be at least three dry runs that will equip Commissioners to be able to connect, engage, and even be able to vote during the proceedings of the Executive Commission. All Commissioners are encouraged to avail themselves for these training sessions. Failure to do so will disadvantage that individual to perform that which they have been commissioned to do.

At the time of writing this article reports from Presbyteries and General Assembly Committees have been received and a quality assurance exercise has been performed on them. Discussions are underway with some Presbytery Clerks and Committee Conveners to clear some of the elements in their reports. This is not done in a spirit of policing but rather to maintain good standards as these reports will remain the Church's records for many years.

As soon as this has been completed a process of collating and putting together the actual 'PAPERS FOR THE 2024 EXECUTIVE COMMISSION' will be done. We are working very hard that the Commissioners will have the papers by the end of April. Our Standing Orders require us to make these available to Commissioners well in advance to allow them enough time to read and prepare themselves adequately.

We call upon all UPCSA Congregations to set aside some time during their Sunday services from now to pray for the 2024 Executive Commission, the Moderator who will be presiding over this, the support team as well as all the Commissioners as they prepare themselves to discern as to what God is saying to His Church at the time such as this.

# MINISTRY COMMITTEE OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The Ministry Committee of the General Assembly has a mandate to oversee the academic and practical training and spiritual formation of candidates to the point of ordination through the office of the Ministry Secretary. The first Post Academic Training (PAT) conference was held within the bounds of Tshwane Presbytery from 04 – 15 March 2024.

The theme of the conference was: "Together going back to basics", it was a hybrid conference with probationers on site, some facilitators joining online and others physically.

There were seven probationers in attendance coming from the following Presbyteries: Amathole, Central Cape, Copperbelt, eGoli, Tiyo Soga, Western Cape and Zimbabwe. Each probationer before the conference had been given a passage to do an exegesis, present, and get feedback from the Ministry Secretary and other probationers.

The Conference started with a conversation with the Moderator of the General Assembly, the Rt Rev Lydia Neshangwe on her Moderatorial Theme "Stronger together". The topics covered for this PAT were as follows: Emotional Intelligence; Gender; Prioritising priorities; Ministers managing the financial affairs of the Congregation; Decolonising Ministry; Vision and Mission of the UPCSA; Administration; preparing a sermon do's and don'ts; Pastoral Care; Power in Association; History of the UPCSA from the roots; Sacraments; Reflections on life in a Congregation; Sharing on Ministering in a different Culturally Congregation; Understanding the Missional Church; Going for growth; and Ethical Leadership.

Excursion/ visiting of different historical sites around the Presbytery of Tshwane was one of the highlights for PAT. The following sites were visited: The Freedom Park and Voortrekker Museum part of their training was to understand the history, context and politics of South Africa for them to be able to practice effective ministry in their communities.

On the first Sunday of PAT 10 March 2024, the Tshwane Presbytery hosted the probationers in different congregations, students were also exposed by attending the appointment service/Induction of the Moderator the Revd Frikkie Botha at Centurion West Congregation.

The last day for the Post Academic Training was the 14<sup>th</sup> of March 2024. The Conference was closed with a Holy Communion service by the Moderator of Tshwane Presbytery which was held at St Columbus Presbyterian Congregation Hatfield.

The Ministry Committee of the General Assembly is humbled by the cooperation and support that it receives from the Presbyteries of the UPCSA. Our heartfelt thank you goes to all in the family of the UPCSA. May we continue to work together in the training of the UPCSA ministers and in furthering the kingdom of God.



### AMATHOLE PRESBYTRY

The Presbytery of Amathole held its Commissioners and Committee Convenors Orientation workshop on the 16 March 2024.

In her opening devotions, Elder Khenke read from Hosea 4: My people are destroyed from lack of knowledge. The workshop was attended by more than 40 Commissioners, Alternates and Committee Members. It was a fruitful workshop attendees gained much needed information.

It started on a very high note where attandees picked a word from a pool of words, which entailed various concepts used in Presbytery meetings. Commissioners had to explain the meaning of the concepts as per their knowledge.

The significance of this exercise lies not only in establishing the participants' vocabulary on UPCSA governance matters but also to deepen their understanding of the Presbytery business.

Through the vibrancy of both the facilitators and the participants, the orientation session's objectives were attained as some participants could be heard saying: "After this workshop, the performance of Amathole Presbytery, including participation in the Presbytery Council meetings, WILL NEVER be the same."

The vibrant workshop equipped the participants on various elements, including: the UPCSA Governance;

roles and responsibilities of Commissioners and Convenors; conducting Presbytery Business; managing Administrative matters; facilitating implementation of the Presbytery Strategic Plan for the development of the Congregations and their communities.

The Moderator of the Presbytery, Rev Allan Nyoni concluded the workshop he thanked Elder Nosipho Mdedetyane Convener of Training and Development, Elder Welekazi Sokutu Governance and Administration Cluster Convenor and Elder Budaza for always willing to donate to the Church.

The Moderator further thanked the Commissioners who came from far and near






































