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

Beloved friends,

This Christmas season you are called to remember that "we live by faith and not by sight" (2 Cor 5:7). We are situated in southern Africa where we are faced with modern ambiguities, families separated by the diaspora, economic depression, social difficulties, religious uncertainties, complex cultures, environmental disasters, relational tensions, and political volatility like the outright war in Mozambique. One can be excused in being skeptical about the promises of God. So I invite you to consider the following story by an anonymous writer.

In a mother's womb were two babies. One baby asked the other: "Do you believe in life after delivery?"

The other replied, "Why, of course. There has to be something after delivery. Maybe we are here to prepare ourselves for what we will be later."

"Nonsense" said the first. "There is no life after delivery. What kind of life would that be?"

The second said, "I don't know, but there will be more light than here. Maybe we will walk with our legs and eat from our mouths. Maybe we will have other senses that we can't understand now."

The first replied, "That is absurd. Walking is impossible. And eating with our mouths? Ridiculous! The umbilical cord supplies nutrition and everything we need. But the umbilical cord is so short, so life after delivery is to be logically excluded."

The second insisted, "Well I think there is something and maybe it's different than it is here. Maybe we won't need this physical cord anymore."

The first replied, "Nonsense. And moreover if there is life, then why has no one ever come back from there? Delivery is the end of life, and in the 'after-delivery' there is nothing but darkness and silence and oblivion. It takes us nowhere."

"Well, I don't know," said the second, "but certainly we will meet the one who carries us, and she will take care of us."

The first replied: "You actually believe in her? That's laughable. If she exists, then where is she now?"

The second said, "She is all around us. We are here because she is. It is in her that we are living and moving and having our being. Without her this world that we have would not and could not exist."

Said the first: "Well I don't see her, so it is only logical that she doesn't exist."

To which the second replied, "Sometimes, when you're in silence and you focus and listen, you can perceive her presence, and you can hear her loving voice, calling down from above us."

Friends, my prayer this Christmas, is that we may not be so absorbed by the darkness of our contexts, or by hopelessness that we fail to see the light that Christ shines onto our situations. John reminds us that, "The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him." (John 1:9-10). May we recognize the free gifts of Christ to us which are light for each day, peace of mind, inexplicable joy, undeserved love, guidance for our steps, gratitude in all situations, hope for the future, and faith for every step.

Believe in the impossible, by faith. Believe in answered prayer, by faith. Believe in a revival for the UPCSA, by faith. "For in Him we live and move and have our being" (Acts 17:28).

Good Friends in Christ

I very seldom hear the world 'miracle' used now-a-days. It is not a word that people seem to associate with a happy surprise. When it is used, it is usually accompanied by a wide gentle smile, sometimes wide eyes, and with speechlessness. Christmas is a miracle. After generations of waiting, God sent a Saviour. The fact that God came at all – born as a human child – is a miracle. C.S. Lewis wrote: "Miracles are a retelling in small letters of the very same story which is written across the whole world in letters too large for some of us to see."

So, in its own way, a miracle is a wonder made smaller, simpler, for human eyes to see. As a minister in a congregation for the last 26 years, I often prayed for a miracle. I prayed for a bad diagnosis to turn out for the better or I prayed for a destructive relationship to change or a 'disaster-in-themaking' to turn out different. Sometimes the miracle came, right there in front of my eyes, and I found myself speechless and wideeyed. Sometimes the miracle happened in and to me - I changed my point of view or the person I had been praying for changed and then I realised that the change was just as much a holy miracle as something more spectacular. Whatever happened, when it happened, I knew and I was moved to worship.

Christmas is a high point for the Christian community. We practice the giving and receiving of gifts to imitate the behaviour of our God who gave the greatest gift we could have hoped for, a Saviour – Jesus, who ultimately turned our story around. It was a "small letter" event in a backwater of a village in the smallest and least important of countries in the Roman empire, but it had eternal and decisive consequences for the entire human family. In C.S. Lewis' words, it was a story "written across the whole world in letters too large to see."

I hope you talk more about miracles this Advent and Christmas season, not just in the Sermons that are preached, but also in everyday life.

A year ago, a friend and retired minister wrote:

"Feeling sorry for myself with edging tooth ache (which the Dentist said would subside, but it has increased), and hearing of the son of a good friend committing suicide, and writing a eulogy for a friend overseas who died of a brain tumour totally changing his beautiful person in the last 3 years, I came to my favourite Coffee Shop for my espresso over ice.

The barista on duty told me: "Sit 'young man', I've got your order, we'll bring it to you." In walks a single mom of 30ish whom I counselled when she fell pregnant 13 years ago and has struggled ever since but maintained a lovely faith in Christ. As my coffee arrived, a guy I married 12 years ago came over to greet me so warmly that the next table stopped talking. He thanked me for 'starting us off on a good marriage that is still great.' In walked a young "gym type" healthy chap with a T Shirt: "Give thanks at all times, pray continually." A young mother and her daughter arrived, and the child dropped her fluffy toy which bounced to and under my table. Easy to retrieve and return. They give thanks and I hear them singing a gospel song as they leave. 1 Corinthians 10:13 tells us when tempted (to self-pity for me in this instance), Christ will provide a way of escape. He sent 3 or 4 in about 6 mins today.

Easy to take them and have an easy ride back to thanksgiving." (I've changed some of the references to anonymise

Treasure the everyday miracle. May it be a joy-filled season.



THE HISTORY AND GROWTH OF THE 24-HOUR PRAYER




The inception of the 24-hour prayer came about from the Gender Desk under the committee of the General Assembly, Church in Society. It originates from the Covid19 pandemic as a source of hope, as the faith community and the nation, at large, were fearful of the future. Some were even making strides to adjust to what was termed "the new normal" which consisted of isolation and social distancing which had affected worship services as attendance was

either restricted to a particular number or prohibited.

The Gender desk then saw the need for the faith community to advance the Lord in a prayer of petition and thanksgiving as reflected in Philippians 4:6-7 "Don't worry about anything, but in all your prayers ask God for what you need, always asking him with a thankful heart. And God's peace, which is far beyond human understanding, will keep your hearts and minds safe in union with Christ Jesus." Such attempts seemed fruitful with the 24-hour prayer that occurred for the first time on the 25th till the 26th of November 2022 with its theme from 1 John 5:14 "This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything to his will, he hears us."



The second prayer on the 8th till the 9th of December 2023 came to the fore when the need for a prayer on gender-based violence intensified. The prayer was fruitful as it gained momentum. Led by the Gender desk the denomination embarked on the journey with its theme from 1 Peter 5:7 "Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you." The initiative also allowed Presbyteries and Fellowships to address the social ills in prayer.



As many would know, the scourge of GBV is rife across the world where more and more women and children are dying at the hands of someone they know and love. We acknowledge that gender-based violence is not necessarily limited to women and children as men too are abused. One, however, cannot deny the growing statistics that show that 38% of women being murdered globally are at the hands of an intimate partner and that 1 in 3 women has at some point in their lives experienced GBV. That on its own should make many of us uncomfortable and not only is it scary but calls for us to continue fighting against GBV and to stand in the gap in prayer against it.

The pleasure of experiencing the UPCSA from the 22nd to the 23rd of November 2024 cementing itself with a momentous annual event of the 24-hour prayer is ineffable. This year was the 3rd year of the event continued and growth experienced not onlv in terms of participation from members of the UPCSA but also in awareness and conversation.

PRAYER THEMES & THEIR IMPACT

This year, themes and Scriptures were presented to Presbyteries and Fellowships

for them to reflect and pray on. Themes such as female genital mutilation, rape, survivors, and breaking the silence were among the themes reflected and prayed upon. Such conversations arguably are shunned in the bounds of the Church because they are viewed as secular conversations that have no place in the church when in fact they do. After all, the Church cannot turn a blind eye to the lived experiences of its constituency as it forms part of greater society. Female genital mutilation on its own is a human rights violation that also cannot be ignored and needs to be addressed. Many people do not understand what exactly it is and how it affects women however it is such crimes that constantly need to be stood up against.

In 24 hours, so many people came forward to reflect on their personal and vicarious experiences of gender-based violence. Many of these stories were a reminder that many people are going through so much pain and need protection and prayer. Beyond that, there is a need to stand up and act against GBV. Other themes such as toxic masculinity, the education of young boys about gender justice and fathers matter, perpetrators stood out as well. More and more men are called out to stand against GBV and call out even those they know to be perpetrators to stop causing harm to their loved ones.

It is also worth noting that the prayer is gaining momentum with Presbyteries, Fellowships and members of the UPCSA gaining interest in approaching the Lord in petition and gratitude. Amongst others, the Gender desk appreciates the willingness to

stay up for the entire 24 hours. The Committee's evaluation of this year's 24-hour prayer led to the discovery that views on a social media platform (Facebook) stood at 863 views which is an improvement.

The Gender desk would like to thank The Moderator of the General Assembly the Rt Rev Lydia Neshangwe, Moderator designate Rev Dr Amon Kasambala, Presbyteries, Fellowships and members of the UPCSA for being part of the journey of prayer. The Committee is hopeful that as we continue to pray the Lord will heal our land as reflected in 2 Chronicles 7:14 "If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land."






