### **Dear friends,**

The story is told of two friends who were hanging out together - a newly moulded clay pot named Clay and a newly made wax candle named Wax. The sun came out and greeted them with a big smile and said, "May I hang out with you?" Clay and Wax said, "Sure, you can join us."

The sun joyfully joined them. The sun's heat rose and rose to its highest temperatures for the day. As a result, Clay began to harden, and Wax began to melt. The clay hardened and hardened, and became stronger and stronger. The wax melted and melted. It lost its shape and began to fall apart. It became a hot and formless liquid. It stopped being a candle that gave light. It lost its function; it lost its purpose.

The same heat that hardened the clay, melted the wax - same heat but different results. Because of what the item was made from. Now in this life we as believers face heat left right and centre. Relational heat,

economic heat, cultural heat, legal heat, political trouble or even spiritual dips.

The question is what are you made of? Are you made of faith and trust in God so that trouble makes you stronger? Or are you made of fear and doubt and poor self-esteem so that trouble melts you and makes you fall apart? You suddenly forget who you are in Christ. The heat makes you lose your identity. And you lose your God given purpose. You forget the vision that God has given you. You forget the role that only you can play because there is only one you.

Jesus said something that is true for everyone: "In this world you WILL have trouble." Jesus did not say you "might" or "may" or "possibly" or "could" have trouble. It is definite – you "will" have trouble, because we live in a fallen world. This means when you experience trouble, hardship or suffering, this is nothing unusual or uncommon or surprising. Even if you are Christian, you will find yourself blindsided, betrayed, treated unfairly, or suffer the consequences of your bad choices. Jesus is saying expect trouble because trouble is common to all.

But Jesus doesn't leave it there. He goes on to say, "But take heart, I have overcome the world." In other words, do not melt under the heat as if you have no faith. Do not fall apart under the heat as if you do not have Jesus. Do not suddenly forget your identity or your purpose because of suffering. Be like the clay. It feels the heat yes, but it is perfected by the heat. May we, as we face situations of heat, allow God to perfect us and make us usable for kingdom purposes in our churches and in the society where God has placed us

### GENERAL SECRETARY'S COLUMN

As we approach Easter, the high point of the Christian calendar, I am reminded that it is at the same time the anniversary of an event that created our faith and at the same time the core of what unites us. The death and resurrection of Jesus created the Christian faith. The new believers gradually parted ways with the communities of Synagogue and Temple as they gathered together in homes. Acts 2: 42-47 describes the phenomenon like this:

*They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled*

*with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.*

Catholics, Anglicans, Methodists, Presbyterians and almost everyone else cleaves to this story about how our faith was born. We have these life changing events in common. This year we also celebrate a later event, the Council of Nicaea, which took place in May 325. It produced a Creed that expresses the faith of a united Church. What is even more wonderful is that the Churches in the Eastern Orthodox tradition (who follow the Julian calendar) and Churches in the West (Protestant and Catholic) will celebrate Easter on the same day this year – 20 April! This is a rare occasion. 2025 raises the bar even further for us in that the Jewish Passover falls over our Holy week (12 – 20 April)! Can you believe it?

These moments of synchronicity are worth celebrating. They deepen our awareness of God and neighbour who are to be the focus of our love. Let's truly experience this Easter as a call to be one – as Jesus so fervently prayed in John 17.





### The Community of Churches

The UPCSA participated in the Council for World Mission's Africa Region meeting from 18 to 21 March 2025 in Blantyre, Malawi. The delegation consisted of the General Secretary, the Rev Richard Mkandawire (representing M&D) (Zambia), Ms Netsai Pamela Timoti (Zimbabwe) and Ms Ntomboxolo Pennington (South Africa). Our own Dr Lungile Mpetsheni, who is attached to the Zomba Theological University led the morning Bible Studies, concentrating on prophetic passages of Esther 3 & 4, Judges 4 and Genesis 4 calling for bold interaction with the empires experienced in daily life. We are called to be messengers of Kingdom values in the neighbourhoods God has placed us. The contrast between the kingdom of God with its invitation to live in life affirming ways and the world around us which divides people and entrenches a violent survival of the fittest worldview is staggering and yet Christians can be carriers of Good news for all the people.

We reflected on the UPCSA and how we could jump start programmes aimed at sustainability, hope, nurturing earth, encouraging women leadership and peacemaking. Keynote addresses were

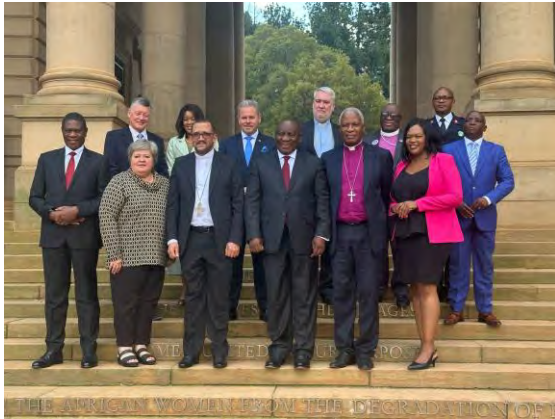
given by CWM General Secretary Jooseop Keum, Scots/Malawian academic Kenneth Ross and academics Thandi Gumedze and Teddy Sakupapa. Good discussion was had and ideas were planted for further missional engagement.



### A Pastoral visit to Dr Mpetsheni

Since the CWM Members Mission Forum was held in Blantyre, I took the opportunity to visit with Dr Lungile Mpetsheni, former General Secretary and currently Partner in Mission which is teaching at Zomba Theological University. Dr Mpetsheni and I spent a day together, discussing UPCSA matters and I was able to enquire after his health and wellbeing in his new position. The Vice Chancellor and Deputy Vice Chancellor of Zomba Theological university showed me around Zomba and we enjoyed a lovely lunch together at a local restaurant.

Continue to pray for Dr Mpetsheni in his important work of lecturing and especially as he leads the inaugural MTh in Missional Studies offered there in partnership with CWM.



### A VISIT TO THE UNION BUILDINGS

A last item that deserves mention here, though, is that I participated in the National (South African) Church Leaders Meeting held virtually on 3 April 2025 and was subsequently invited to join a delegation of Church leaders (Bishops, Moderators and General Secretaries) which met with the State President, the Deputy President and various Ministers of Cabinet) on Friday 11 April 2025 at the Union Buildings in Tshwane.

Various matters ranging from crime to corruption, the G20 meeting later this year and the promised “National Dialogue” was discussed. I addressed the President and Cabinet (on behalf of all the Churches) on the challenges and concerns experienced by the Church in dealing with the Department of Home Affairs. Many of our ministers have not been registered as Marriage Officers although they have fulfilled all the requirements. Some Marriage Officers have tried to have their files transferred when they have moved without success and many report peculiar and outlandish rules they have to follow in registering a marriage. Many of these “rules” are not applied in other Home Affairs offices. I called upon the President

(and the Director General of Home Affairs) to collaborate with the Churches to find understanding, co-operation and efficiency. I also raised the problems transnational churches face to facilitate visas and work permits for ministers who are called and appointed to a country other than their home.







You can feel the energy in the room when Children's Ministry Leaders get together!

We certainly felt it on the 1st of March when almost 50 Sunday School Teachers from 17 different congregations got together in the Presbytery of Tshwane.

We enjoyed a time of fellowship and training and encouragement. We spoke about many aspects of children's ministry, focusing on age appropriate ways to teach Bible lessons and to help young people grow in their relationship with Jesus.

It was such a blessing to be able to share ideas and to feel the sense of teamwork as we all realised we're not alone in our passion to teach God's truths to the kids and teens in our Presbytery.

We have plans for ongoing communication amongst the POT Children's Ministry teams. We have a curriculum that is free and easy to share on WhatsApp. And we're planning some singing events for the children in our

Presbytery, so that they can also see we are part of something much bigger than just our local congregations.

We're excited about what God will do with the energy we share as the Children's Ministry Leaders in our Presbytery serve and teach His children this year!

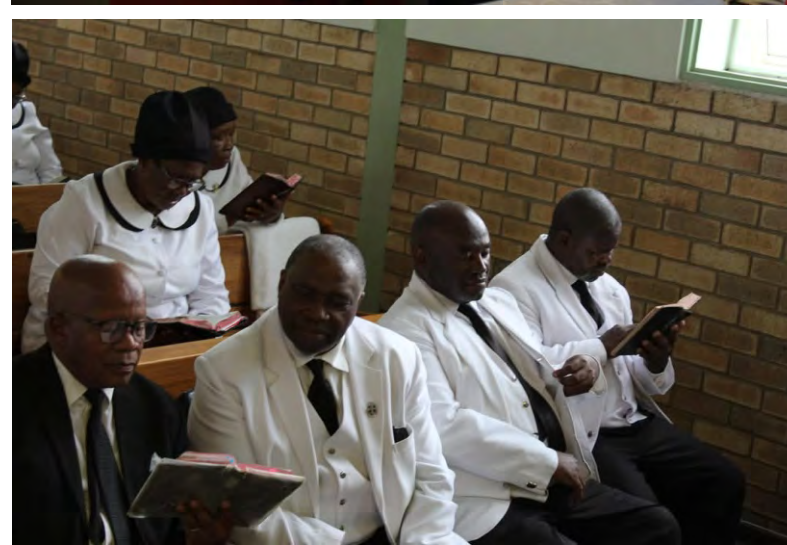

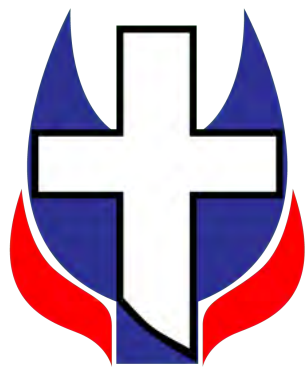

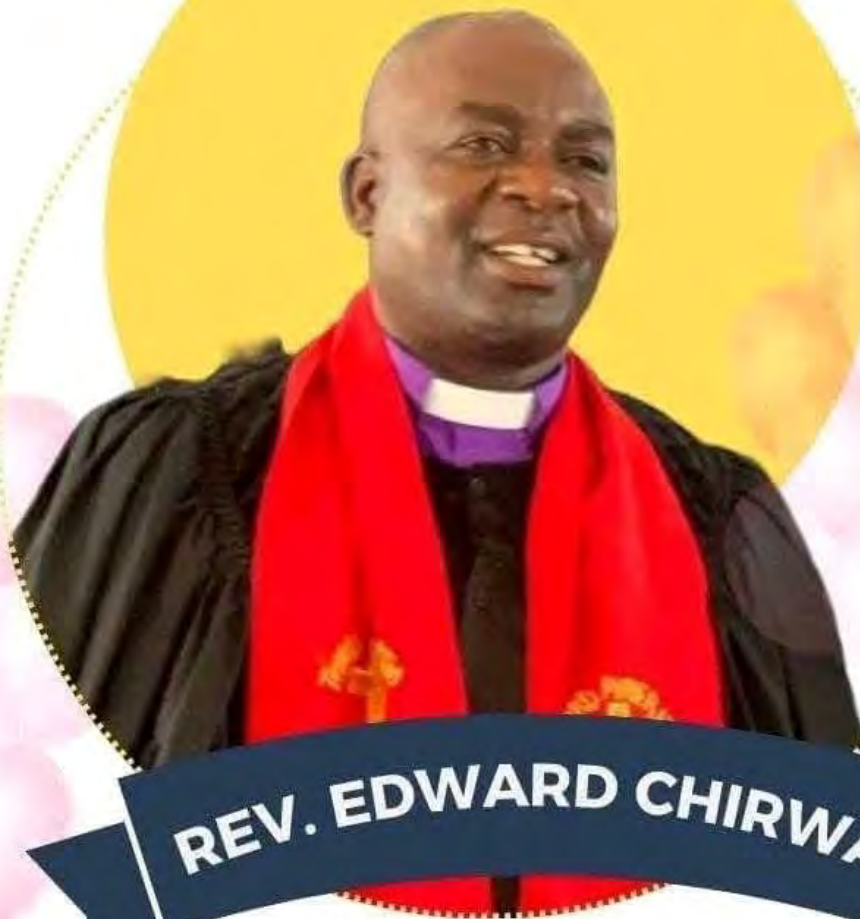
