PARTNERS IN MISSION: A MARATHON MARKED FOR US

The best thing about running a marathon race is that you can decide at what pace you want to run. And so, it is not how fast or how hard you run, it is how you strategically pace yourself as you listen to your heart beat each time you change a step.

As soon as it was Friday 4th July 2025, a day after the General Assembly in Mthatha, my marathon race kicked it. To say the least, since that day, it has been from one event and conference to the other. In all these, there have been some great moments of spiritual encounter, development of new relationships with different strategic Partners in Mission (PIM) of the UPCS family, and also times to reflect on lessons learnt from each experience.

Starting the marathon race in July with the Fellowship of the Youth in Kimberley was such a huge opportunity to observe and participate in the vision crafting of the

emerging leadership of the UPCS. Hope was created, vision was imparted, and a clear roadmap was navigated at that youth conference.



Then came the Fellowship of Women in August held in Johannesburg and hosted by the eGoli Presbytery. For those who were not there, it would be like just telling a story. The atmosphere of that conference was invigorating and inspiring, having hundreds of women gathered in one huge hall – praising the Lord amidst their busy scheduled, was captivating. The women have got it when it comes to organizing themselves. They stroke a code of excellency throughout their conference



At a time of writing this article, I have just returned from the Fellowship of Men conference which was hosted by the Limpopo Presbytery and held at Makwarela congregation. For those who have been

attending many conferences of the Fellowship of men, they will be able to testify that this conference, which has just ended, was unique. Amidst tight business schedule for the conference, the men made room for a deeper spiritual experience. They gave time to evangelism, biblical teachings and times for revival worship services. I was amazed to observe at a Sunday service how men sung and danced uninhibitedly – something we can only attribute to God presence among the men



In additional to attending conferences, the marathon race took me to dedicating a beautiful state of art multipurpose dining hall in Tutura, Easter Cape, within the bounds of Tiyo Soga Presbytery. What is amazing about this building is that it was built through the fundraising initiatives of the Fellowship of Women of Tutura congregation – and dedicating it during the Women's month of August was just like icing a piece of nice cake.



Returning to Limpopo, the marathon race took me up the hills of Venda land. I joined a crowd of Presbyterian men and women

who decided to pay courtesy at the Venda King's palace. Our visit was made very special as the King and his dear wife emerged dressed up in the UPCSA Fellowship of Men and Women uniforms respectively. The King's welcoming speech was spot on as he declared openly allegiance to the Lordship of Christ over his life and the Venda Kingdom. In simple words of invitation, he asked us to count on him and his wife as true Partners in Mission (PIM).



The theme "***Partners in Mission***" came alive when while in Limpopo as a huge crowd of UPCSA women, Youth, Young Women and Men accompanied each other in a long traffic convoy (*Traffic control officers had to lead the way because of this long convoy of cars and buses*) to go and hand over a beautiful house, built by the Fellowship of Men in Limpopo, to a vulnerable UPCSA widow and her grandchildren.

A lot of us shed a tear as we watched the keys of the newly built house being handed over to the new Owner. It was like watching the gospel we preach in words come alive for the first time in a long time. We were proud to be part of the Presbyterian family



Partners in Mission marathon race is encountered everywhere as we have seen above – in *conference centres, Zoom call meetings, in communities, Sunday services and business spaces*. At the time of writing this, my encounter with Partners in Mission happened in the corridors of academics – at the Faculty of Theology, University of Pretoria, where I had the privilege of presenting a paper on Mission and Partnerships and also witnessing the launch of a book on *Missional Theology in Context* edited by our very own UPCSA senior lecturer at the University. The Dean of the Faculty highlighted the fact that the UPCSA is a strategic partner in mission for the University.



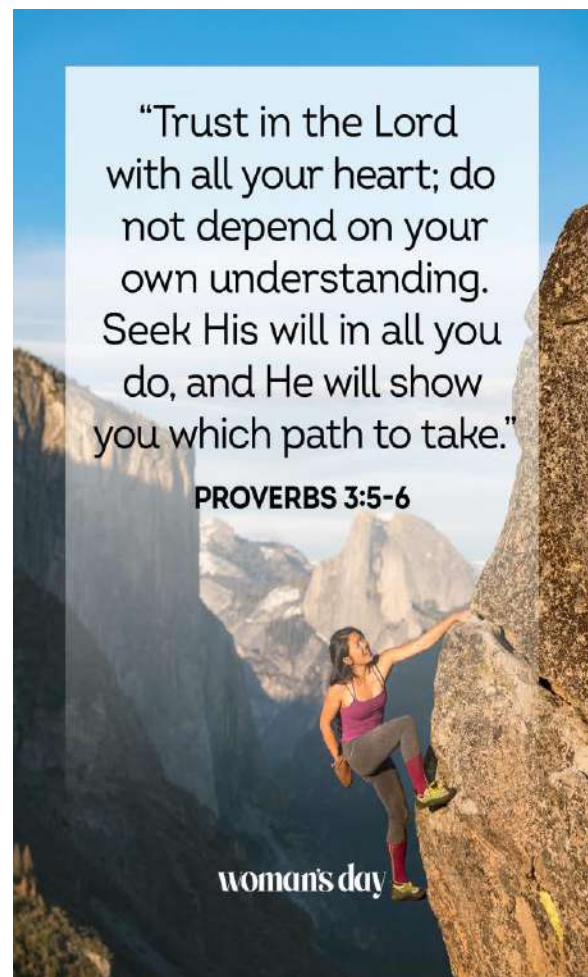
One does not need to say any more – when your strategic partners show you exactly where the marathon race lines are already

The Prodigal Father

The **Month of October 2025** has been set aside in the entire UPCSAs as a Missions Month. This means that in our worship services as a body Christ, in our family and personal devotions, and in our daily work schedules; we should think about our commitment to missions.

If God, as a Prodigal God, has reached out to us, it is time to think about others outside our Church buildings and our comfort zones who also need to hear the good news. God counts on us to reach out with grace, compassion and acts of mercy to a world that is calling for our help. May you make this month a special month of Missions.

As if that was not enough we also saw the Fellowship of Women in Limpopo building yet another house for a family, in a small village called Makurung, next to Lebowakgomo township. All these conferences had one common item which seeks to assist needy families, it being school uniform for kids, groceries for poor families, paying school fees for learners and many more initiatives. We carry some of these initiatives in this issue of the Presbyterian Link.

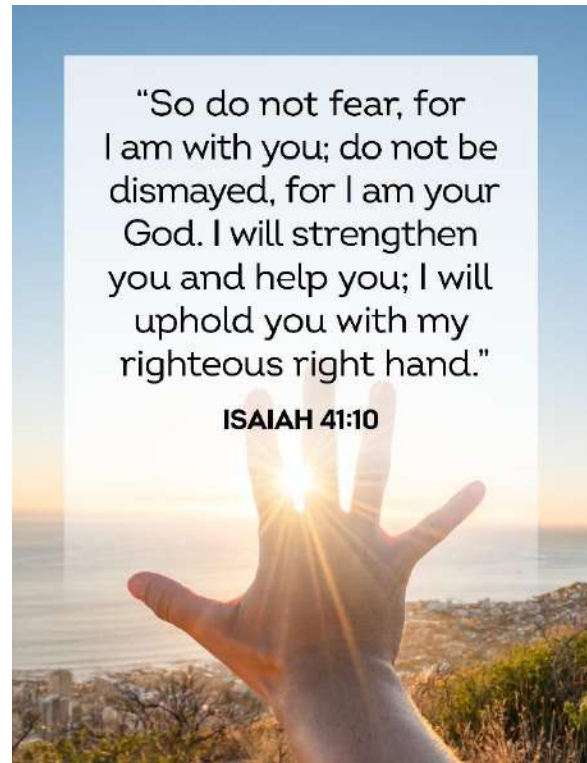
We also carry stories of the Moderator of General Assembly's engagement with our Presbyteries and Congregations. Since his induction in the last General Assembly, the Moderator, Rev, Dr Amon Kasambala has been travelling throughout the Denomination, from DRC – Zambia – Zimbabwe - South Africa, interacting with the structures and the membership of the UPCSA, including the Fellowships. He has in this regard, attended all the Conferences, and staying throughout the duration of the Conference. What is pleasing is that the Moderator is always with his team comprising the CFC Convener, Rev Thabani Masikane, General Secretary, Rev, Dr George Marchinkowsky and the Clerk of Assembly, Rev Vusi Mkhungo. Each interaction has been a learning curve and we commend the Central Office Team for this most wonderful job they are doing.

encouraged by the emerging trend that we see happening in the Denomination. This is the focus on revival services and outreach programs, which realize that the people will not necessarily come to the church, but that the church must also go to them. The initiative of the men to visit and work with the traditional leaders is one such example. In Zambia we have seen during the Moderator's visit that a successful revival service was held. It is these type of programs and activities which will see many people returning to the church of Christ. We are grateful to see that the 'Going for Growth' motto is being put into action. With the Moderator leading from the front.

GOOD FRIENDS IN CHRIST

Following the Assembly, I attended the **Induction of the Rev Heidi Peterson as Chair of the South African Synod of the UCCSA**. This service was held as part of the biennial Synod meeting, and in Queensburgh, KZN. The UPCSA congratulates Rev. Peterson, who is well known in Presbyterian circles through her involvement in various committees (She serves a United congregation), the Church Unity Commission and the South African Council of Churches.

I attended a meeting of the **Church Unity Commission**, where we sit alongside representatives of the Anglican, Methodist, Congregational, Dutch Reformed, United Reformed and Lutheran churches. The surprise was to discover – in the course of reporting back on our General Assembly – that our partner Churches have the same hot and emotive issues as we do and the mainline denominations also experience disagreement on the pressing issues of our time.

In **South African Council of Churches** forums, we are struggling with the **National Dialogue** in South Africa and to what extent churches participate. The feeling of a singular lack of freedom in terms of how we participate characterised our conversations. The Churches acknowledge that South Africa has huge social and financial problems and that something must be done at every level and in every sector of society but we resist being told how to contribute to possible solutions. The conversation is ongoing.

Here in the **Central Office**, we have completed most of the Post General Assembly tasks with the Proceedings of Assembly due for publication shortly. We have also held a Consultation of Standing Committee Conveners, orientating newly elected committees in their work and “getting the ball rolling” on a new year of Assembly work. Conveners were not only orientated but also briefed on expectations as we prepare for the **Executive Commission in June 2026**. The Assembly Business Committee has met, under its new Convener, the Rev MC Magagane. The Local Organising Committee for EC2026, under the Convenorship of Highveld Presbytery Moderator, Wayne van Heerden, has been constituted and started to look toward that gathering. We have completed our **Staff mid-year Performance Review** and our new Church Office and HR Committee Convener, the Rev A Nemaunkwe, has visited the Central Office to greet the Staff.

As a response to the terrible devastation which happened prior to General Assembly in Mthatha and throughout the surrounding areas, we were able to distribute a total of **R280 000** thanks to the generosity of UPCSA congregations and Presbyteries as well as the Council for

World Mission. In addition, gifts in kind such as clothing were transported down to the affected areas.

The **Fellowship of Youth** and the **Fellowship of Women** both met during this time. Our Moderator attended and participated in both. I was able to attend the Fellowship of Women which took place in Mulders drift, in eGoli Presbytery. What a powerful conference it was and what innovative conversations took place! Congratulations to both the DEC and the Local organising committee for putting together such a well-run event.

Living in a world on the verge of catastrophe

In recent weeks, the events reported from around the world (Ukraine, Gaza, the USA especially) reminded me that we live in a volatile time. The advance of secularism threatens the traditional and mainline Church. For the first time in the Church's history (2000 years), we run the real risk of gradual extinction. In addition, powers have arisen in the West, the historical home of the Presbyterian tradition, which threaten our worldview and the values we hold dear. This includes the protection of the foreigner, the sojourner, the orphan and the widow. Africans in all four countries of the UPCSA are being nefariorised as regards foreign travel and welcome. We stand at the brink of war on multiple fronts and those who pretend to have the moral high ground protect villains. In a recent address, the General Secretary of the Council for World Mission, Dr Joosup Keum, labelled our situation as **"a world on the edge of catastrophe."**

This is a time for the Church to stand for justice and peace. Presbyterians cannot stand by while the marginalised, poor and suffering become the targets of those in

power. Remember the Proverb: "If you say, 'But we knew nothing about this,' does not He who weighs the heart perceive it? Does not He who guards your life know it? Will He not repay everyone according to what they have done?" (24:12) We must speak out, and stand up, but we must never devalue the power of intercessory prayer. Henri Nouwen writes:

To relearn what praying for the world means, we have to realize that the burden of the world has become a light burden because of Jesus. When God saw how humanity's sin made the world an unbearable burden – a burden of painful birth and hard labour, competition and rivalry, anger and resentment, violence and war, sickness and death – God showed us infinite mercy in sending Jesus, not to take our burden away but to transform it.

Jesus gathered up the human suffering of all times and places. He destroyed its fatal power by offering it to God through his voluntary death on the cross. Thus, Jesus made an unbearable burden bearable. We now have a companion who has tasted the agony of humanity more fully and deeply than any other person in history.

Pray with me. Pray for our Church. Pray for our broken world – Afterall, it is the World Christ died to save.





The Amathole Presbytery successfully hosted three conferences in August and September 2025.

1. 22 - 24 August the Fellowship of Young Women held their Annual Conference at Semple Memorial Congregation, under Reverend Magagane. The conference was constituted by the newly appointed Presbytery Moderator, Reverend B.Z. Mkentane, and centered around the APFOYW theme, "Breaking the Chains, Stepping Out with Jesus," based on Philippians 4:13. This event was a resounding success, with young women coming together in worship and praise. The conference concluded with a generous donation of a sewing machine to unemployed FOYW members, empowering them to start their own initiatives.

2. From September 12th to 14th, 2025, the Amathole Presbytery Fellowship of Youth (APFOY) held its 4th Annual Conference in Zwelitsha, graciously hosted by St. Phillips Congregation under the leadership of Reverend Sam. The conference was truly spirit-filled, centered around the theme, "After 40 years in the wilderness, NOW, a moment to contemplate on the Lord's Covenant is pivotal, it calls for a revival to our pilgrimage." Reverend Mkentane officially opened the conference and extended his best wishes for its success.

On the second day, members of the APFOY donned vibrant Kofifi attire, creating a festive atmosphere as they enjoyed an evening enriched by powerful speakers who delivered inspiring sermons. As the conference came to a close on the third day, three congregations were recognized for

their outstanding contributions in the fundraising competition. Auld Memorial Congregation claimed first place, earning not one but two trophies, while Burnshill Presbyterian Church secured second place, and EN Bono Congregation took home third place.

3. The Fellowship of Women concluded September with their 4th Annual Conference held in Queenstown. The Conference was hosted by JZS Ncevu Memorial Congregation, under Reverend Mbaru. This year's conference generated considerable excitement as attendees gathered to elect a new executive. The theme for the conference was "Transcendental Women of God, Cling onto the Cross," inspired by Hebrews 12:1-2. The elections took place smoothly on Saturday, followed by the induction ceremony on Sunday morning, conducted by former Moderator Reverend Nyoni, who offered words of encouragement, stating, "Leadership is not a POSITION but ACTION."

Limpopo hosts a successful Conference of the Fellowship of Men

It was all excitement, revival, and evangelizing, as the Fellowship of Men held its 6th Denominational Conference in Limpopo Presbytery. For the first time, this Men's Denominational Conference was held within the Vhembe Cluster, at Makwarela Congregation. Attended by over a thousand men, this proved to be one of the most successful conferences of the Fellowship.

After being Constituted by the Moderator of the General Assembly, Rev Dr, Amon Kasambala, conference hosted the 'Thursday in Black' event, which is an awareness program against Gender-based violence.

The event was attended by the representative of the Provincial Commissioner, a former inmate and offender, who is now an Ambassador to bring awareness to society on GBV, Mr. _____ and the Deputy Minister of Police, Dr Polly Boshielo. Also present were representative from the Department of Correctional Service. the intention was to engage on strategies on dealing with GBV and how the men can collaborate with state institutions to fight against this scourge. Valuable lessons were derived from these practical engagements with men committing themselves to fight against GBV.

The Conference also received a Bible study conducted by Rev Mautji Pataki on 'Ethical leadership' in all aspects of life. Rev Pataki took conference through very practical activities which constitute unethical leadership, and impressed upon men that as Christians we have an obligation to not only talk about ethical leadership, but to practice it as well.

Instead of having the traditional fraternal greetings, by sister Fellowships, the FoM took a different way of doing it. Instead the Fellowships engaged in discussions on the theme of the Moderator and the theme of conference. Each made a short presentation which was engaged by delegates. Again valuable and constructive ideas came out of the panel discussion which are really aimed at building and growing the church of Christ. All these were supplemented by the inputs from the Convener of the Fellowships Committee, Rev Thabani Masikane and the General Secretary, Rev, Dr George Marchinkowsky. This is where we saw the meeting of the minds were each and every speaker emphasized that as a church, and Fellowships we should be outward looking, and seek growth in our programs.

The highlights of the Conference was the Missional Evangelism program which started on the 01st of September 2025, before all other delegates arrived. Evangelists from all over the Denomination descended to Makwarela, were from Monday, they went from place to place spreading the Gospel. Each morning they started at the places of Traditional leaders, then proceeded to clinics, hospitals, police stations, prison, and taxi ranks. Vhembe was under siege as the Gospel of Jesus Christ took over.

The Evangelists also visited families of our members who might be having people who are sick or the Elderly who are no longer able to go to church, those who just had bereavements and those who just asked for prayers. One highlight of the program was when the whole conference was adjourned and visited the Tshivhase Royalty. This is where we saw mass evangelism and Thovhele Tshivhase was so grateful that he received such an honor.

The climax of the Conference was when the whole conference descended to a village called Hamutsha, to hand over a house to a destitute family, which was built by the Limpopo Presbytery FoM. The house was handed over to the family by the President of the FoM, Rev Nkululeko Nojoko and the Moderator of General Assembly, Rev, Dr Kasambala. We are indeed grateful to have seen God at work in Vhembe.



As part of the Men's campaign against climate change, ten trees were planted by our Ministers at Makwarela Congregation. Two more trees were planted at Hamutsha where a house was handed over, this being to bring awareness on climate change and to discourage our communities from destroying our God given natural resources. The Pan African Presbyterian Men Fellowships, to which the Fellowship of Men is an affiliate, has pledged to plant about a million houses within the next three to five years. This was in contribution to this campaign.



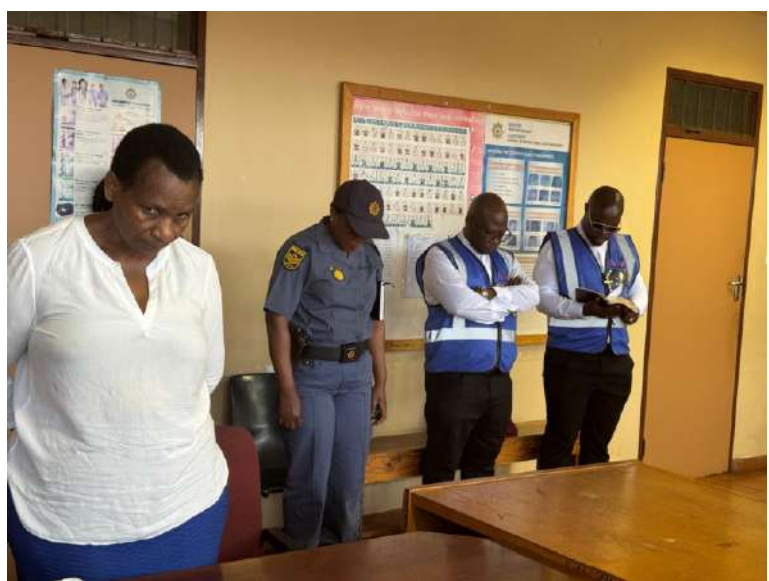

Then we had our Clergy planting trees, led by the Moderator and the President as part of the climate change campaign.

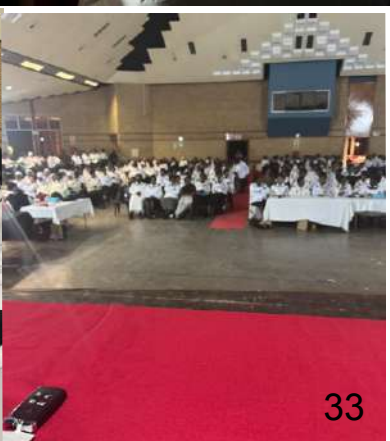

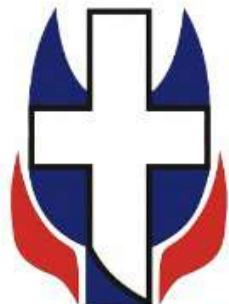
Fellowship Of Women

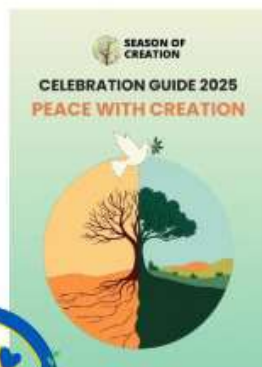

Affirms God as Creator

- The Bible begins with the story of creation (Genesis 1–2), showing that all of nature is God's good work.

Emphasizes Stewardship and Responsibility

- Humanity is given the role of caretakers or stewards of creation (Genesis 2:15).

Connects Environmental Care with Justice

- Creation care is linked to social justice: caring for creation is also caring for our neighbors.
- "Whatever you did for one of the least of these... you did for me." — Matthew 25:40

How To Celebrate

- **Practice Stewardship:** Encourage your church or household to adopt eco-friendly habits, planting services
- **Reflect on Scripture:** Genesis 1–2 (Creation), Psalm 104 (Praise for Creation), Romans 8:19–23 (Creation's groaning and hope)
- **Worship and Prayer:** Hold special services (out door worship) focused on creation, using Scripture, songs, and prayers that honor God as Creator.

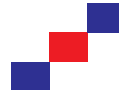
