


Partners in Mission (PIM),

Compliments of the New Year 2026. We thank God that we made it to this year. Unbelievably, the year is already having a marathon race of its own – You and I, at the time of writing this pastoral letter, are already in the closing 4th week of January!

Consolation

As we celebrate the New Year, we are also aware of those who are very sad due to the misfortunes caused by torrential rains and severe flooding across parts of Southern Africa, which have killed more than 100 people in three countries – South Africa, Mozambique,

and Zimbabwe. Our UPCSAs members and their families living in these affected areas have not been spared. We would therefore, like to stand with them in prayer, asking God to console them over the loss of life and loss of property they have suffered. During these moments of loss and grief, we are reminded of this passage of scripture:

“No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him (Christ) who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers... will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.” (Romans 8:37-39)

May the Lord come through for all affected families.

Youth

I was reminded, when on the first day of school opening, I took a photo with one of our youngest Presbyterians who was

being dropped by her parents at a nearby school to start her Grade 1, that the denomination in its trans-nationality church structures has a challenge of looking after its youth and creating space for them. This should not just be a show of numbers to indicate that we have youth on our sessions and presbyteries, but it should be a deliberate intention to make sure youth are part of everyday life of the church – our plans, services, activities and all that makes us the UPCSA. As I travel around to attend invitations of renaming and dedicating church sanctuaries, I cannot help but see that many of our UPCSA congregations have very few youth (if not, no youth at all) who are part of the life of the church. Fellow partners in mission, I am highlighting this so that we begin to plan how we can make the youth become part of the congregation life throughout the UPCSA. Needless to state that some congregations are contented to have no youth, but it does not take a rocket scientist to figure out that such congregations have a short life span – It is just a matter of time before such congregations begin to close its doors for lack of membership to take the church forward. May you take this as your 2026 challenge – to include on your sessions, presbyteries and synods meeting agenda, an open discussion on how we can seriously involve the youth in the life of the church. My encouragement to you is to begin with those young people who are already under your care and then work around building a mentoring strategy as you provide space for the youth to fully participate and add value to your congregation and presbytery life.

Commitment

Last year, I closed the year with a pastoral challenge on the need to support the denomination financially.

I would like to reiterate that I was shocked to see that some of our congregations, presbyteries and synods have not remitted anything to support the denomination. The purpose of me reminding you about this is not to make you feel guilty, but to challenge you in love and grace that unless we all become determined about supporting the church, the ministry and mission work in the UPCSA will remain just a long-distant dream. May I encourage you to commit to supporting the church financially this year.



Good Friends in Christ

The Central Office opened for the new year on Monday 5 January 2026. All members of Staff are “up and running” with meetings running at a very high frequency in the last two weeks of January. Last year, we began an Internship Pilot Project, providing a “work experience” opportunity for a young adult who had finished tertiary education but had not yet had work experience. Our first Intern, Nkwenkezi Bosiki, has excelled in this position from May 2025 until end January this year. We said “Goodbye” to him on 30 January 2026. In January, we went through a recruitment process and Mandisa Mbatha has been appointed as our next Intern, starting on 1 March 2026. We look forward to interacting with her during this year.

Meetings and more meetings\

In the month of January, I attended several major meetings to kick the year off. These included Assembly Business Committee, the Consultation of Assembly Committee Conveners, Pele NPC, the Assembly Finance Committee, the Assembly Standing Commission, The Priorities & Resources Committee and the Joint Liaison Committee with the UCCSA. The HR Task Team of the COHRC also met on 21 Jan.

In addition, I participated in a Summit at the SACC headquarters in Johannesburg on Wednesday 28 January 2026 on the CRL (Commission for the Promotion of Rights of Cultural, Religious and Linguistic Communities) and relevant structures that the government has and is implementing. This summit formulated a collaborative response from the churches which are part of the SACC.

The schedule for February and March

The CFO and Finance Department have rolled out the Budget process for Assembly Committees, Central Office, and Office Bearers for the 2026 – 2027 Financial year. Committees are expected to respond soon so that the Finance Committee can finalise the proposed budget by 17 April 2026 in time for the deadline for reports for the 2026 Executive Commission.

The Clerk of Assembly and Administrative Department are working on the preparatory tasks for the planning of the 2026 Executive Commission. This involves in depth interaction with all Presbyteries during February and reminding of the deadline for reports from Presbyteries and Committees on 17 April 2026.

The Assembly Business and Local Organising Committees are also participating in this preparation. The Executive Commission will take place from 13 to 17 June 2026 at Gateway Presbyterian Church in Kempton Park.

The Ministry Team has been hard at work on integrating new Students for the Ministry (from Discernment 2025) and seeing the existing Students into their next academic year. They will soon turn their attention to the PAT Conference to be held at uThukela from 15 to 27 March 2026.


Apart from attending to Central Office responsibilities and ecumenical liaison with all of the regional and world-wide bodies the UPCSA is a member of, I will make a few visits in February:

- I will serve as Clerk of the Special Commission to Mahwelereng, Mokopane, Presbytery of Limpopo.
- I will be in Thekwini Presbytery visiting the Umtentweni Retirement complex on behalf of Pele NPC.
- From 18 to 22 February, I will accompany the Moderator on a visit to the Presbytery of Zimbabwe.
- I will be attending a meeting of the Robert Niven Trust in Makanda in late February and meet with a group of business people in Stutterheim interested in renovating the Mgwali Mission – the Church where Tiyo Soga served after returning to South Africa from Scotland.

Recruitment of a Clerk of Assembly

The Church Office Committee will begin the next phase in the recruitment process for a new Clerk of Assembly on 2 March 2026. This will include two phases of shortlisting with interviews envisaged for mid to late April. In addition, the work and impact of the PEF is being assessed by a Task Team for report to the 2026 Executive Commission.

It is a pleasure and a joy to have been called to participate in all this and to see first hand the impact that the Central Office and Assembly Committees have in the list of the Church.



HEAVY RAINS AND FLOODS IMPACT CHURCH COMMUNITIES IN EASTERN PRESBYTERY

As Zambia, like many parts of Southern Africa, continues to experience heavy rains and flooding, the Church has not been spared from the effects of these natural calamities. Communities within Eastern Presbytery are currently living through the impact of this challenging season.

I recently spoke with Rev. Zachaeus Chilembo of Chipata Presbyterian Church to gain insight into the extent of the situation and how the Church is responding. Rev. Chilembo explained that the torrential rains have significantly affected five families from Lundazi District and four families from Chama District.

These families, whose livelihoods largely depend on subsistence farming, are facing serious uncertainty as their fields remain waterlogged, raising fears of poor harvests and potential food shortages.

In addition to the challenges facing households, the Church's infrastructure has also been affected. Romase Preaching Station, under the pastoral oversight of Rev. Chilembo, sustained damage when strong winds accompanied by heavy rainfall blew off the roof of the church building. This damage has disrupted worship activities and compounded the difficulties faced by the local congregation.

Despite these challenges, the Church is making every effort to support the affected families by providing assistance and offering whatever help is appropriate to the situation. Pastoral care, prayer, and practical support remain central to the Church's response during this difficult period.



As a precautionary measure, the Church is also encouraging its members to register for and participate in government relief and disaster-response programs, so that in the event of further calamities, affected families may access timely assistance.

The Church continues to pray for God's protection, provision, and strength for all those affected, while standing in solidarity with communities as they navigate the ongoing effects of the floods.



Behind the scenes, however, God was at work—preparing an energetic and ever-jovial servant, Rev. Robert Chawinga, formerly Minister-in-Charge of Kabanana Presbyterian Church, to step into the role once held by Rev. Lungu.

That long-awaited day finally arrived as Kaunda Square Presbyterian Church received its new minister with open arms. For those who missed and or those who had stepped outside during the service, the unmistakable sound of ululations and sustained jubilation echoed from within the church building—a powerful expression of relief, gratitude, and celebration that the long wait had finally come to an end.

In a brief talk with the new minister in charge he exclaimed that, all this happening are the doings of God and him as a servant has little control and promised to work according to the directive of the Holy Spirit and help the congregation to sow to great heights.

As Kaunda Square opens a new chapter in its journey of faith and ministry, Kabanana Presbyterian Church simultaneously closes one chapter of its own. On behalf of the Kabanana congregation, one cannot help but ask: **what comes next?**



MCHINGA PRESBYTERY WOMEN FELLOWSHIP ADVANCES CHURCH SUSTAINABILITY THROUGH MT. ZION FARMS

The Fellowship of Women of Mchinga Presbytery continues to make steady and commendable strides in extending the work and witness of the Kingdom of God through practical and sustainable initiatives. In line with this vision, the Fellowship has begun developing Mt. Zion Farms, located in Chongwe District in the eastern part of Lusaka, Zambia, as a productive agricultural and ministry resource for the Church.

As part of the initial phase of the project, the women have successfully prepared the land and planted groundnuts and red maize.

This undertaking is aimed at transforming the farm into a viable and productive asset that will generate resources for the benefit of the Church, while also promoting self-reliance and stewardship.

The project reflects the Fellowship's commitment not only to spiritual growth, but also to economic empowerment and long-term sustainability within the life of the Presbytery.

Speaking on behalf of the Fellowship, Elder Ruth Chirwa, the Presbytery Secretary from Chelston Congregation, noted that the vision for Mt. Zion Farms current focus is on agriculture rather than infrastructure, although plans for construction are underway, subject to financial availability. "Our immediate priority is to build ablution facilities, followed later by a church hall and dormitories", she said.

As part of the initial phase of the project, the women have successfully prepared the land and planted groundnuts and red maize.

If a conference is held before construction is complete, tents will be used as temporary accommodation. This initiative also forms part of our evangelistic mission to win more souls and eventually plant a church. Though it is a long-term project, the women remain enthusiastic and hopeful.

Elder Chirwa explained that the establishment of such facilities would enable the farm to serve as a retreat and conference centre for women's fellowships and other church groups within the Presbytery and beyond. This, she added, would create a conducive environment for fellowship, training, prayer, and spiritual renewal, while maximizing the use of the land entrusted to the Church.

The initiative stands as a testament to the dedication, unity, and vision of the women of Mchinga Presbytery, whose efforts continue to bear fruit both spiritually and materially. Members of the Church are encouraged to support and pray for the success of this project, as it represents a significant step toward strengthening the mission and sustainability of the Presbyterian Church.

Rev. Edward Chirwa Calls Youths to Active Service at Synod Fellowship National Conference

In an atmosphere charged with great expectation, curiosity, untapped talent, and a deep desire to learn and appreciate the work of God, more than 350 young people at Baukilano listened attentively as the Synod Moderator, the Rev. Edward Chirwa, delivered his maiden sermon in that role at the Synod Fellowship of Youth National Conference.

The conference was held at Moomba Secondary School, located at the far end of Central Province in Chibombo District.

Officially opening the conference, the Moderator of the Synod of the Uniting Presbyterian Church in Zambia (UPCZ) set the tone by reminding and teaching participants on the importance of “serving God under His revelation.” His message resonated strongly with the youths who had gathered from all five provinces of the Church, with the furthest participants travelling from Lundazi and Kanele Bokosi Wanu.

Rev. Chirwa emphasized that while many believers wait on God to perform wonders in their lives, they must remember that waiting must be accompanied by service. He stressed that youths must be actively involved in the life and mission of the Church, describing them as the backbone of the Church. In his sermon, the Moderator highlighted several key take-home lessons

Divine Connection

Effective service to God, he explained, begins with a personal relationship with Him. Rev. Chirwa underscored the importance of knowing God and being known by Him, noting that human connections alone are limited and unreliable. Believers must therefore cultivate a genuine relationship with the Creator of heaven and earth, which he described as both a necessity and a privilege.


Prophetic Encounters

God has always spoken and continues to speak through His servants, the prophets. By reading and meditating on Scripture, believers encounter God's revealed love, grace, kindness, and mercy. Such engagement with the Word provides guidance on how to serve God according to His revelation.

Visions and Symbols

From Genesis to Revelation, God has used visions and symbols to reveal Himself to humanity. Understanding these divine revelations, Rev. Chirwa noted, equips believers to serve more effectively in God's vineyard.

Rev. Chirwa concluded his sermon with a prayerful charge, asking God to grant the participants revelatory experiences that would enable them to serve Him more faithfully, effectively, and efficiently.


On behalf of the Synod of Zambia, the Synod Clerk, Elder Benson Njobvu, has expressed sincere gratitude to the Moderator of Munali Presbytery, Dr. Overs Banda, for the generous gesture of offering the Synod of Zambia an opportunity to share office space with the Munali Presbytery Clerk and Secretary at the Presbytery Office, located at the Presbyterian House in Kabwata. Elder Njobvu further acknowledged Dr. Banda's kindness in personally providing an office desk and chair for the Synod office.

Elder Njobvu is pleased to inform members that the Synod Office is now operational. He explained that the Synod Core Executive will be utilizing the office from time to time as part of its administrative functions. With this development, members are hereby informed that the denominational headquarters of the Presbyterian Church in Zambia is currently situated at Kabwata Presbyterian Church, within the Presbyterian House, where the Synod is presently sharing office space with Munali Presbytery.

This office will serve as the central administrative base for the Presbyterian Church in Zambia.

Meanwhile, the Synod has formally written to Kabwata Congregation requesting consideration for the reallocation of office space that had previously been offered to the Synod but was not operationalized at the time. Elder Njobvu noted that the Synod is prayerfully hopeful for a positive response. Should the request be granted, the Synod will be able to operate from a dedicated office, separate from Munali Presbytery, while remaining within the same location.

He concluded by giving thanks to God for these encouraging developments in strengthening the administrative capacity of the denomination and encouraged all members to continue praying for unity, growth, and progress within the Synod of Zambia. "Indeed," he said, "we are truly partners in mission."

Also on 24 January 2026, Christian Runyararo Chikomo was licenced to serve his one - year probation with St Stephens' Seke UPCSA.




